Bloemfontein Society of Model Engineers

Preserving Tradition - Building Community

Founded in 1957 by Harold Marshall Smith and a dedicated group of model engineering enthusiasts, the Bloemfontein Society of Model Engineers (BSME) has a storied, 67-year history rooted in a passion for craftsmanship and community. Here follows a brief history of the early days of the society and some recent developments.





A Legacy of Determination

The BSME's story began with Harold Marshall Smith, a founding member of the Rand Society of Model Engineers. Smith was one of the founding members of the RSME (Rand Society of Model Engineers). He was transferred to Bloemfontein in 1956 as Branch Manager of Schindler Lifts and was disappointed that there were no organizations like the RSME in Bloemfontein. Together with George Rhodes-Harrison, he arranged a meeting for those interested in model making. The meeting took place at the Cecil Hotel, Bloemfontein on 13 July 1957. This was the inaugural meeting and led to the BSME being officially formed.

In the beginning, there were not many models available, but with an organized society, development was rapid, and it was not long before there was a live steam section and a marine section. They used the pond at the National Zoo in Bloemfontein for the Marine Section. For many years, the only steam loco was that of Harold Marshall Smith, which was run on a private piece of track that he owned. In 1965, Jan Hugo's donation of a partially completed locomotive led to collaborative efforts among members, resulting in the completion of the club's iconic "Springbok" locomotive, now retired and housed in the BSME museum after traveling around 8000 km with the club. Forty-five meters of portable track was built in 1966.

Securing a Home and Expanding Horizons

The society was very anxious to have their own ground where they could lay down permanent railway track and build a clubhouse. After several years of negotiation with the City Council, a piece of land at 6 Rhyn Street, Bayswater, was obtained in April 1969. Members were quick to take advantage of this, and within six months, model trains were running over a triple-gauge track nearly 400 meters long. An early success of the club during this time was its hosting of the South African Model Railway and Engineering Exhibition in the Bloemfontein City Hall in 1970.

A permanent clubhouse building and a steaming bay with space for 20 locos were constructed in the late '70s/early', and a longer inner track was also later added, which is now used as the mainline. Over the years, the society has been a home for many enthusiastic members to enjoy and share their love of model engineering with like-minded friends and the public. Modenso Park (from "Model Engineering Society") has played host to many National Steam Meets in the past, as well as always participating enthusiastically in those events of other clubs in the country.







Nurturing the Passion

Today, the BSME remains a home for model engineers. Under the inspiring leadership of our chairman, Christo Slabbert, young members enthusiastically develop their skills as budding model engineers, meticulously maintaining and operating engines. The society aims to preserve the craft of model engineering with a specific focus on model locomotives. Although the society is small at present, enthusiastic members are consistently working on their engines, which include a 3 1/2 gauge lvy Hall (built by Malcolm Grant and now owned by his grandson Liam), another 3 1/2 gauge loco owned by chairman Christo Slabbert (previously owned by his father and built by Jimmy Scott), and a Simplex owned by Heinrich Lategan (built by Erns "Ertjies" van Rensburg). Mario Laubscher also regularly runs his two locomotives: a 16DA and Class 25, both built by his father Leon Laubscher. Current projects include a 16DA under construction by Liam (started by his grandfather) and a class 23 owned and being completed by Christo. The club operates a petrol locomotive named "Cookie" (built by Dave McFarlane) for its passenger hauling duties.

Renewal and Growth

In recent years, the BSME has embarked on a journey of revitalization. The society is very grateful to its older members for continuing to open and operate the club during a challenging period in the late 2010s. While the club's membership has become more modest, efforts to re-establish connections with former members and engage with the local community through social media and partnerships with local media outlets like My City Bloemfontein and Bloemnuus reflect the society's determination to build and grow. The BSME currently consists of about 14 members, but we are always happy to get reacquainted with previous members and reestablish positive relationships with old friends. We welcome all previous members to visit the club whenever they like.

The society's commitment extends beyond its membership, regularly opening its doors to the public every Sunday afternoon. The club regularly hosts children's parties and welcomes visiting groups such as pre-primary schools, churches, and community organizations for private running days.

Recently, the club has also re-established a tradition of hosting a regular market day, which takes place once a month. The most recent of these, which took place on 17 March, welcomed over 1000 visitors with around 650 train tickets sold and featured two steam locomotives: Mario Laubscher's class 25 as well as Michael Eykelhof visiting with his class 15A. His grandfather Willem Nel also visited with a lovely Sweet Pea. Other activities included horse rides and a jumping castle. Cars in the Park also hosted an exhibition of beautiful old vehicles which drew great interest.





Despite ongoing challenges such as a shortage of passenger cars for large events, aging club infrastructure, and a shortage of steam locomotives for passenger duties, the BSME remains committed to preserving and promoting the craft of model engineering. The society invites enthusiasts of all ages to join its legacy, offering a welcoming environment to learn, share, and celebrate the art of model engineering.

We also specifically welcome contact with members from other clubs in South Africa.
